The Parish Council met at Victory Hall, Laxton.

113/16 **MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING – Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on 28 June 2016 should be confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

114/16 **DECLARATIONS OF PECUNIARY AND NON-PECUNIARY INTERESTS** – There were no declarations.

115/16 **CLERK UPDATE**– The Ouse and Humber Drainage Board had submitted a bid to the Humber Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) for the additional funds required by the Saltmarsh Pumping Station project. The decision from the LEP was expected by the end of the month. The suggestion to hold the 2016 Bonfire at the Village Hall was to be considered at the next Village Hall Committee meeting. Etton Parish Council had agreed to co-fund the Clerk’s Cilca training.

116/16 **WARD COUNCILLOR UPDATE** - Councillor Aitken updated the meeting on the recruitment to the Drainage Board’s Chief Executive position. East Riding of Yorkshire Council was to produce a calendar promoting the cultural events and activities that would be held during the 2017 City of Culture year. It was agreed that the Clerk would circulate details about the Council’s request to relevant contacts within the community.

117/16 **PUBLIC PARTICIPATION** – There were no members of the public present.

118/16 **CORRESPONDENCE** - **Resolved** – (a) that the following correspondence should be received by the Council:

- i. Yorkshire Water - Regarding Sewerage Improvements
- ii. Humberside Police - July Newsletter
- iii. ERYC - Notes from the Parish Council planning workshops

(b) that the Parish Council would consider taking part in the March National Spring Clean day (c) that the Parish Council would purchase one copy of the Good Councillors Guide and (d) that two Councillors would be put forward to the “Good Councillors Course”.

119/16 **ERYC BUS CONSULTATION** - As discussed at the meeting of the 28th June 2016, the East Riding of Yorkshire Council had consulted on proposals to withdraw funding to a number of bus services in order to make £16 million pounds of efficiency savings. This was likely to result in the withdrawal of the bus service in Laxton. The Parish Council expressed disappointment at the proposal because it was aware that a number of residents relied on the service. Councillors also noted that there had been very little feedback from residents when asked their views on public transport during the recent Parish Council survey and community newsletters.

Resolved - (i) that the Clerk replies to the consultation expressing disappointment at the proposal and requesting advice in promoting alternative transport options and (ii) that the Parish Council would promote rail time timetables during future newsletters.

120/16 **ERYC LIBRARY CONSULTATION** – As East Riding of Yorkshire Council was also carrying out a consultation on proposed changes to the library service. As part of this proposal, the mobile library would no longer visit Laxton and the Howden Library and Customer Service Centre would be combined into a Multi Service Centre. This centre would be open for 20 hours, compared to the current 15 hours of the library and 39.5 hours of the Customer Service Centre. It was noted that the mobile library received a very low number of users each month.

Resolved - that the Clerk replies to the consultation expressing disappointment at the cancellation of the mobile library and requesting that the new Multi Service Centre should operate a late midweek night and a Saturday opening.

121/16 **FUTURE COMMUNITY NEWSLETTERS** –The Parish Council reviewed the format and content of the community newsletters introduced in 2015. Councillors felt that the newsletter was a helpful tool in communicating messages to residents and asking for feedback on local issues. The Parish Council was often asked to promote initiatives from East Riding of Yorkshire Council and it was agreed that these articles should be balanced with local stories.

Resolved - (i) that the newsletter would be issued bi-monthly subject to available content, (ii) that Ward Councillors would be invited to add articles (iii) that the newsletter would promote events from the Village Hall, the Church and other local businesses.

122/16 **EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT CHECK AND TRAINING - Resolved** - that Parish Councils would check the equipment in the emergency store at 7pm on the 22nd September.

123/16 **HIGHWAYS, DRAINS AND DYKES** - Councillor Collins had spoken to East Riding of Yorkshire Council regarding another sewer burst where it was believed that sewage may have entered the dyke near Church Lane. Councillor Aitken agreed to obtain a written update.

124/16 **HEDGES ENCROACHING FOOTPATHS** - Residents had reported a number of hedges encroaching footpaths, which made it difficult for people with wheelchairs, push chairs, dog walkers etc. to pass.

Resolved - (i) that the issue would be reported to East Riding of Yorkshire Council and (ii) a future Community Newsletter article would seek to raise awareness of the problems caused by encroaching hedges.

125/16 **GARDENS AT CHURCH CLOSE** - The communal garden at Church Close was very overgrown and blocked a number of houses from the view of neighbours, making residents feel isolated and vulnerable. East Riding of Yorkshire Council had agreed to cut the hedges back in October, however, the Parish Council felt that this matter should be addressed as soon as possible.

Resolved - (i) that East Riding of Yorkshire Council should be asked to cut the garden back urgently and also whether it would allow the Parish Council to carry out the necessary work.

Howdenshire Update for August 2016

1. Priority

Issue: Youths causing annoyance around the areas of the Church and playing fields in Gilberdyke.

Throughout August, officers will continue to patrol the above areas on Clementhorpe Road to deter any potential anti-social behaviour. Anyone caught engaging in anti-social behaviour will be dealt with under the FAIRWAY process jointly with East Riding of Yorkshire Council. It is unlikely that any discretion will be shown.

2. Meetings

Crime Prevention Surgery- Howden Police station

PC Benson and PCSO Chandler will be available on the 5th August from 12:30- 15:30 hours to offer crime prevention advice, cycle coding and methods of recording property.

Police Drop In Surgery

PCSO Simon Palmer will be holding a surgery at the Travelling Library, Gilberdyke Memorial Hall car park, Clementhorpe Road, Gilberdyke on the following dates: Wed 10th August (16:30 to 17:30 hours) and Wed 21st September (14:00-15:00)

3. Examples of Crimes in your area.

- A down pipe was pulled off the side of the Methodist Church in Gilberdyke causing damage.
- Entry was gained into a secure shed in a rear garden in Bubwith and a bike and various items were stolen.
- An electric saw and soldering kit were stolen from a shed in Bubwith.
- A motorbike which had broken down near Bubwith was stolen.
- A secure shed was broken into and equipment stolen.
- An outer pane of glass in a UPVC window of a property in Holme Upon Spalding Moor was damaged, however no entry was gained.

4. News and Appeals

Intelligence is the Key

Crime intelligence is a key element of the work that the Police do. Many enquiries involve the collation of a wide variety of information in order that a successful prosecution can be achieved. But intelligence gathering is much more than this. Often it is the way by which officers from our Community teams get a full picture of what is happening in their areas, and often involves details of suspicious incidents seen by the public being passed onto us.

Public appeals through the press are routinely made at local level; sometimes at national level for serious offences. They raise the profile of serious incidents in the hope that information can be gathered which will lead to the successful prosecution of an offender. But the need to gather intelligence can be equally important in the day to day policing of our neighbourhoods as well.

A conversation an officer has in the street; an incident log received at the Police Station detailing a suspicious person or vehicle seen; that sighting of an individual who's moved into the area, all can sometimes provide officers with that extra piece in the jigsaw that they need.

If you get a suspicious individual wandering around; if you see a suspicious vehicle driving slowly around your estate; if you notice something unusual at a house that you think is out of the ordinary, you have two choices: either ignore it, and hope it isn't anything important, or contact the Police. We'd much prefer that you called us! We'd rather check on something to find it's in order than not know and later find out that a crime has occurred.

Our officers are out on patrol and routinely stop check people or vehicles. But they can't be everywhere all the time and your help is essential in helping ensure that we get the intelligence we need.

So please, let us know if you see anything suspicious in your neighbourhood. If you can safely get a registration number of a vehicle or a description of a person, please do so as this all helps build the bigger picture and could help detect or deter a crime.

Call us on the Non Emergency Number 101 or 999 in an emergency or if a crime is occurring.


Humber – keeping you informed

July 2016

This newsletter provides an update on work taking place and/or planned to help reduce the risk of flooding to people and properties around the Humber estuary.

Surveying a big success!

Our Geomatics Team has now completed surveying the bed of the estuary from the Humber Bridge up to Boothferry Bridge on the Ouse and Keadby on the Trent. The survey was very successful and we learnt a great deal. The survey has produced quality data to help us better understand how the estuary is changing. We also learnt more about which survey techniques work best when surveying such a dynamic estuary like the Humber. This data will help inform the comprehensive review of the Humber Flood Risk Management Strategy (see below), supporting decisions on how we best manage the risk of flooding and erosion around the estuary. This data collection is part of our Humber Monitoring Strategy, which sets out a programme of works to provide us with information. We plan to do more surveying later in the year including aerial photography and LiDAR (Light Detection And Ranging) which maps land elevation. Humber Flood Risk Management Strategy

Alongside our partners, particularly the Humber local authorities, we are undertaking a comprehensive review of the Humber Strategy. This will involve us reviewing our long term plans for how we best manage the risk of tidal flooding and erosion around the estuary. The review will inform our new programme of scheme development work that will be designed to commence directly after the conclusion of the current 6

year programme in 2021. We plan to have consultants in place to begin the work in Autumn. We then expect the review to take around 2 years to complete.

Whilst this is being undertaken we will continue to deliver our 6 year (2015-2021) programme of work, investing over £86million of government funding in reducing the risk of flooding to over 50,000 properties around the estuary.

North bank

Hull Frontages: We are progressing on schedule to have all necessary approvals in place by summer 2017 to enable works to start early 2018. The expectation is that construction works will take approx 3 years to complete. The scheme is looking to deliver a programme of improvement works along the city frontage, in collaboration with landowners. We have started to talk to those with an interest in improving these defences to understand what the best solutions might be and securing the necessary funding to enable works to start.

Hull River Defences Package: We are planning on improving the river defences through the city of Hull, so that they continue to provide long term protection from the risk of flooding from the River Hull. We are continuing to work in partnership with Hull City Council with the aim of providing a scheme which will contribute towards growth and regeneration on the river front in the city. The business case for the scheme has now been approved so we expect to start design and construction work later this year.

Welwick to Skeffling Managed Realignment Scheme – community event:

We held a community drop-in in July to speak to local people about a habitat creation project. The Welwick to Skeffling Management Realignment Scheme will create important habitat to replace ongoing losses and provides an opportunity to reduce flood risk to land and communities. The event was successful with local people attending to voice their concerns, speak to experts and understand the scheme better.

South bank

South Ferriby & Barton: We are about to appoint consultants to continue in the development of both Winteringham Ings & South Ferriby and Barton to New Holland schemes.

We have completed ground investigations along the existing flood embankments at South Ferriby, and also between Blacktoft and Yokefleet, in the past few weeks. These are routine site investigations, whereby we

drill boreholes in the flood embankment to take soil samples to understand the ground conditions. The locations of the boreholes have been chosen by using the results from geophysical survey work last summer. Using these results has allowed us to pinpoint what parts of the insides of flood banks we are particularly interested to know more about. Please see picture below.

Winterton Beck: A survey highlighted that there was elevated silt levels in Winterton Beck. In April we successfully undertook desilting between the flushing gate and Winterton Beck outfall, reducing silt levels to the cill of the outfall structure. Please see pictures below.

Further desilting is required downstream of the outfall to allow the continued operation of the pointing doors and to allow discharge of water through the system into Winterringham Haven. We are progressing with the approval for this work. We are also planning on carrying out regular flushing of Winterton Beck and surveying of the silt levels. Together these will advise us of the optimum flushing regime to reduce silt build up.

Keadby terminal outfall scheme: We have started a package of works to ensure the Keadby terminal outfall [pumping station and gravity sluice] continues to operate effectively over the next 5 years. This includes the replacement of 2 pump engines and refurbishment of other critical components. The work is progressing very well, having started in March and will be completed over a period of 9 months.

The Keadby terminal outfall plays a key role in managing the drainage of the River Torne and associated watercourses. This package of works is part of a comprehensive solution to sustain the operational capability of the terminal assisted outfall into the future.

Isle of Axholme: We are continuing to work closely with the Doncaster East Internal Drainage Board, Isle of Axholme Water Level Management Board, North Lincolnshire Council and Doncaster Metropolitan Borough Council regarding the future management of the Isle of Axholme. There are currently 17 schemes within the Isle due for completion by 31 March 2021, of which one has already been completed. Collectively the work will help to manage flood risk for over 20,000 properties, 36 kilometres (22.4 miles) of critical infrastructure and over 46,000 hectares of agricultural land. A multi organisation governance structure has now been put in place to drive this important piece of work forward

Burringham: The site has been left undisturbed for several months allowing natural ground compaction to continue. We continue to work with our contractors to carry out further inspections. Any further minor remedial works to control any remaining light seepage will then be carried in advance of the winter conditions.

Although flood defences reduce the likelihood of flooding, the risk can never be removed entirely. Flooding can happen at any time and we advise people to take simple practical steps to help reduce the impact of flooding to their homes or business.

TO ALL EAST RIDING PARISH COUNCILS

East Yorkshire Motor Services Limited (EYMS) is the County's principal public transport operator, with over 6 million passengers boarding our network of commercial bus services across the East Riding every year. We provide employment for over 500 local people, are locally owned and managed, and provide key transport links for residents work, education and leisure trips around the area's market towns

East Riding of Yorkshire Council (ERYC) have issued a consultation on reductions to their spend on the contracted local bus network. This supplements the commercial network to cover services that the council feels there is a social need for that otherwise would not be covered by the commercial network.

Details are available on the Council's website at <http://www2.eastriding.gov.uk/environment/public-transport-travel/review-of-bus-services-in-the-east-riding/> The proposals envisage an annual saving of £600,000 from the councils current £1,300,000 budget for contracted service payments to operators. If agreed It would be introduced in two phases in April 2017 and April 2018.

Whilst only a limited number of services will be directly affected in proportion to the commercial and supported network as a whole, the current contracts provide a significant contribution to EYMS' fleet and overhead costs. This means that we can only save the fuel and driver cost on the contracted services and we estimate that the proportion of our fleet and overhead costs that have to be covered by the commercial network will increase by 9%. As a result we will have to review the network and this will mean consequential service reductions in parishes that are not directly affected by the current ERYC proposals.

We would therefore ask parishes to consider not just the impact of the current contracted service reduction proposals on their residents, but also the consequential damage on the bus network as a whole at a time when environmentally sensitive transport and access to employment and other services for non-car owners (often our most vulnerable residents), is of growing importance.

To ensure East Riding of Yorkshire Council have the widest response to their consultation we would urge you to make a response by the deadline of 28 August 2016.
